
On behalf of all the staff in Boclair I wish you and your families all the very best for the summer and I look forward to seeing your children when they return in August.



JUNIOR STEM CLUB



We look forward to beginning new projects relating to the UNCRC in August and continuing to work towards the Silver Rights Respecting Schools Award.



SPACE SCHOOL



Andrew wins a place on the Scottish Space School visit to the NASA facility in Houston, Texas!

The Scottish Space school programme is an opportunity for pupils to participate in a number of engineering-based activities, all of which are aimed at increasing the awareness of engineering and the career opportunities available.

Space school was a one-week, residential programme run by the Faculty of Engineering at the University of Strathclyde. 600 S5 pupils from across Scotland applied for the 80 available places. Andrew and Freya won places on the school, which was fantastic. Andrew was then invited to attend a further selection day with just 30 of the students. This was to decide the 8 who would be selected to go to NASA, USA. At this event Andrew had to complete a group task and go through tough interview process. Andrew excelled on the day and has been offered a place on the Houston trip! This is a superb opportunity and very exciting for Andrew and the school.

S2 WIDER ACHIEVEMENT

The wider achievement activity in S2 is called the Saltire Award. The Saltire Award is an award that recognises young people aged 12-25 who have helped in the community. Young people who achieve the Saltire Award receive a certificate from the Scottish Government to reward their effort.

To achieve our Saltire Award everyone in S2 works to help the local foodbank. We spend time in PSE learning about food poverty and the role of foodbanks, making posters to raise awareness and planning fundraising activities. For example, our class organised a whole school bake sale to raise money. Some pupils in S2 also go to parents' evenings to collect money and food donations. Also, all S2 classes had a Home Economics lesson about cooking on a budget and then designed and cooked a dish. This helped us understand the prices of food and how to try to get the best value when shopping.

As part of their work, each class also planned a trip to Asda and were given a budget to buy things from the shopping list. We used the money we had raised through fundraising to but the essential items. Two representatives from each class then took the items to our local foodbank, which was the Drumchapel foodbank. They were very grateful for our donations.

The skills that we have gained by doing the wider achievement work were working well with others, communicating, budgeting and providing support for people in need. The benefit of us doing this is that everyone has been recognised for their contribution to volunteering through Saltire and can continue to increase and log volunteering hours by helping in school and the community.




Exam results day can be exciting but also stressful. We hope that all our senior pupils get the results that they need and have worked hard for.
